“FAMILIES AND COMMUNITIES: NEW STRATEGIES FOR JUVENILE JUSTICE”

The intervention on juvenile offenders is, to date, a challenge for the Juvenile Justice Systems in Europe, a challenge that has led these systems to gradually rethink their action strategies.

This change in strategy must be developed in full compliance with the instructions that come with the most recent European directives, to give life to a child friendly Justice System. The admonition of Europe is very clear in this regard: each country must make it one of its priorities to create a justice system that is capable of always acting with care and fairness and to promote the welfare and dignity of every child.

This has meant that, on one hand, actions have been taken by the Justice Systems in Europe to reduce the custodial nature of criminal sentences in the case of minors and, on the other, that greater attention has been given to using a more global and interdisciplinary approach in the work with justice involved youth. This new approach emphasizes the need to achieve an even more coordinated intervention on the part of all the actors involved in the minor’s intervention program, that is to say, the community as a whole, with the family at the centre because of its key educational role.

For this reason, at present there is an urgent need to define improved social working strategies capable of assuring the active involvement and participation of the minor’s family and of the key local community professionals, agencies and organizations.

This will be the main focus of the final European conference regarding the FINE – Families in Net, European Union Funded Project. The Conference, which is one of the events falling in the course of the Italian Presidency of the European Union, will be held in Rome on the 1st and 2nd of December 2014. The Conference will offer an opportunity for reflecting upon and discussing the results, prospects and possibilities explored by the FINE Project, the main objective of which was the development of intervention models having family active involvement as their main concern, based on the successful experiences of partner countries in this field.

By sharing the positive findings of the project regarding forging constructive relationships with the families and communities of minors at risk and/or in the penal system, the hope is to encourage other countries to adopt common strategies. Indeed, the Conference will involve representatives from Italy, Spain, Greece, Romania, Germany and the United Kingdom, which are the partners in the FINE project, and representatives from the Justice Systems of Ireland, Portugal, France, Malta and Belgium.

Il monito dell'Europa è assai chiaro in questo senso: ogni Paese deve inserire tra le sue priorità quella di costruire una giustizia che sia capace di operare, con attenzione ed equità e di promuovere il benessere e la dignità di ogni minore. Ciò si è tradotto in una maggiore attenzione a garantire la residualità dell'approccio custodialistico e nella necessità di assicurare un approccio globale e multidisciplinare nella presa in carico del minore. Presa in carico orientata sempre più compiutamente al coinvolgimento e coordinamento di tutti gli attori significativi quali la famiglia e la comunità nel suo insieme. Per tale ragione si pone, oggi, con forza, l'esigenza di definire strumenti di lavoro sociale capaci di rendere i sistemi della Giustizia minorile sempre più idonei a costruire percorsi di intervento, che prevedano il positivo coinvolgimento della famiglia e di tutti gli attori significativi del territorio. Questo sarà il focus della Conferenza europea, conclusiva del progetto FINE Family in net finanziato dall'Unione Europea. L'evento, che per rientra tra gli eventi programmati per il semestre di presidenza italiana del Consiglio dell'Unione Europea, costituirà in primo luogo, l'occasione per discutere esiti, prospettive e opportunità aperte dal progetto FINE, il cui obiettivo prioritario ha coinciso con lo sviluppo di strumenti efficaci per la diffusione di modelli di lavoro con le famiglie (*Family integration programme; Gruppi multifamiliari Badaracco; Family group conferencing*), già peraltro utilizzati con successo in alcuni dei contesti partner (il progetto coinvolge Italia, Spagna, Grecia, Romania, Germania e Regno Unito).

Più in generale, a partire dagli esiti del progetto, la Conferenza intende favorire una riflessione sulle prospettive teoriche ed operative maturate intorno all'obiettivo di costruire proficue alleanze con le famiglie e la comunità dei minori a rischio o del penale, in modo da allargare il confronto anche ad altri tra cui Paesi, Irlanda, Portogallo, Francia, Malta, Belgio.

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
